Memories of Childhood

When my youngest Grand-daughter, Nia, was born in 1999 on October 24th. I knew I would have no trouble remembering the date. **October 24th** was fixed in my memory from early childhood as “**Diwrnod Ffair Borth**” (the day of the Fair), it also happened to be Taid’s (my mother’s father’s) birthday. Y Borth short for Porthaethwy, (Menai Bridge) is the small town in Anglesey where I lived until I came over to Canada.

The history of Ffair Borth goes back to 1691. It was originally a market place for animals, and also a sort of ‘labour exchange’ for farm workers. It was later known for the sale of horses, and ponies – ‘Ffair geffylau’.

I remember watching as the Welsh mountain ponies were taken to the Ffair Borth market. They would often have their manes and forelocks braided and decorated with brightly coloured ribbons and pom-poms. The big strong Clydsedales, the working farm horses, brushed and shining were an impressive sight.

A special memory connected to Ffair Borth was “India Rock Number 8”! During the ‘40s (the time of ration books and sugar shortage, - and my early years!) this was the only day one could buy India Rock and even then there was a limited supply. Taid would get up at the crack of dawn on this his birthday, and queue up to buy India Rock from one of the stalls set up near The Square. He would come home triumphant, (especially if he had been able to buy the Rock made in Llanerchymedd) carrying the brown sticks of rock, which he shared with his grandchildren.

Stalls selling dishes (llestri), linens and pots and pans were the source of many a ‘bargain’ in the post-war years. I believe the number and variety of goods available at the Fair has increased dramatically since those days. Likewise the rides and games have changed no doubt – more modern versions of the swings, the roundabouts, and bumping cars are faster and noisier than those I remember! I wonder, do they still play “Roll a penny” and sell candyfloss??

Now I also celebrate October 24th as United Nations Day, a reminder that the UN Charter came into force on this day in 1945.

In Memoriam

Deryck Evans

It was at a very moving ceremony at Christ Church in Mississauga on October 19, 2002, that we celebrated the life of Deryck Evans, who passed away on October 10. The Toronto Welsh Male Voice Choir attended, along with family and friends, many from Dewi Sant Church.

Deryck was born in Swansea, Wales, on April 24, 1937, and grew up in the nearby village of Pontarddulais. He was educated at Gowerton Grammar School, and Leeds University, where he received a Bachelor Degree in Engineering. He married in 1964, and soon after, in March 1965 he emigrated to Montreal, to work for what was then Northern Electric, the company where he remained for 28 years. 3 children, Bryan, Rhiannon and Huw were born between 1967 and 1972, and in 1973 the Evans family moved to Ottawa (for 4 years) and then to Mississauga in 1977. Deryck was very proud of his Welsh heritage, and wherever he lived he became very active in the Welsh community. He loved to entertain at a Noson Lawen where he sang with his friends or his family. In Montreal he used to perform Tommy Trouble Sketches with some of his friends. For a time he was president of the St. David Society in Montreal, and he sang in the Welsh Male Voice Choir there, as well as later in the Toronto Welsh Male Voice Choir. He often sang in Church, sometimes in a duet with his son Huw. He also attended Welsh classes at Dewi Sant and the occasional Cwrs Cymraeg. He was Mayor of the Welsh Pavillion at Caravan in 1998. Deryck will be greatly missed, and will be fondly remembered for his gift of music, his sense of humour and his love of life, as well as his love for his family and friends.

During their stay in the U.S. Beryl held the position of Executive Assistant to the Canadian Consul General in Minneapolis. In 1984 the family returned to Canada.

In latter years, Beryl was employed by Kuehne & Nagel in Brampton. she is a past President of the UCW, past President of the St. David's Society and has served as Deputy Clerk of Sessions, Dewi Sant Welsh United Church.

On her retirement in the year 2000, Beryl met Ray again after 46 years, and they married and found great happiness together, enjoying the golden years. Beryl was immensely proud of her three children, who had loved and cared for her at all times. She doted on her grandchildren who brought her much joy, and loved her in-law children.

CHOIR RAISES THE ROOF IN LAND OF SONG

The Toronto Welsh Male Voice Choir returned home triumphantly after a concert tour of Wales at the end of August.

After two years of planning and hard work, a group of eighty people set out from Toronto Pearson Airport for Wales, via Manchester, England. Their first stop was the University of North Wales, Bangor, where the group made their headquarters for the duration of their stay in the North. The University campus is situated between the dramatic mountains of Snowdonia National Park and the beautiful Island of Anglesey.

The choir's first concert was held at the quaint St. Mary's Church in Betws-y-coed on Sunday, August 11th, where they sang to a large, enthusiastic crowd. By all accounts it was an excellent concert and it was hoped that the choir would be able to return there at some future date.

On the following Tuesday the choir had a warm reception at the ancient Church of St. Padarn in the town of Llanberis, situated in the Snowdonia National Park. The media headlines read, "*Choir raises the roof in land of song*". It was an electrifying performance to a packed audience who gave the choir a standing ovation. The TWMVC is grateful to Cor Meibion Dyffryn Peris for their hospitality and hosting the concert.

During their time in the Snowdonia, several of the members and supporters enjoyed climbing Mount Snowdon; some took an alternative route by taking the train from Llanberis to the summit. Many of the group took advantage of visiting the Llechwedd Slate Caverns in Blaenau Ffestiniog, the former slate capital of the world, where they experienced the life of the quarryman at the turn of the century. Some wandered past the underground lake, used for two Hollywood films and through the Victorian Village where re-minted Victorian coins are used.

The following day the group visited the famous Caernarfon Castle, one of the most impressive castles in Wales. After lunch they travelled down the coast to Port Meirion to explore this interesting Italianate village built by Clough Williams Ellis (Architect), where the British series "The Prisoner" was filmed.

Thursday morning the choir boarded their coaches for the trip to Cardiff via Dinas Mawddwy, Llanidloes (mid-Wales) and the Brecon Beacons. After lunch in the market Town of Llanidloes, one of the coaches made its way to the Welsh Royal Crystal Factory in Rhayadr where they handcraft full lead crystal from molten glass. On arrival in Cardiff the choir and their supporters were shown to their accommodation at the Cardiff University Hall of Residence which stands in its own grounds two miles from city centre in one of Cardiff's most attractive suburbs.

Friday evening was the choir's first concert in the South, held at the Cardiff Welsh School of Medicine Auditorium. A capacity crowd of 500 showed their approval by giving the choir a standing ovation. This concert was hosted by the Cardiff Arms Male Voice Choir and The British Heart Foundation (Cardiff Branch). Proceeds from the concert were donated to the B.H.F.

On Sunday the choir travelled over the Severn Bridge to Bristol, England. The evening concert was performed at the ancient St. Albans Church at Redland/Westbury Park with Filton Male Voice Choir to another capacity crowd.

The last concert in the South was held at St. Margaret's Church in Mountain Ash. Once again the choir sang to a capacity audience, including a few familiar faces: Reverend Alwyn Evans and his wife Janet and Gerry and Lowrie Taylor. After the concert the choir were entertained to supper at the Bowls Club, including singing by the famous Cwm Bach Male Voice Choir, our host.

During their stay in Cardiff the choir members and their supporters visited the Museum of Welsh Life at St. Fagans, where they had the opportunity to explore the many reconstructed buildings from all over Wales. Some buildings dated back hundreds of years, right up to the 1950's. They also enjoyed an excursion through the Rhondda Valley with a stop at Rhondda Heritage Park at Trehafod where they saw how coalmines actually worked.

On Wednesday, August the 21st the choir boarded their coaches once again for the trip back to Bangor, North Wales via Shrewsbury and the A 5 route. The last concert was performed at The Town Hall, Llangollen, home of the International Eisteddfod, (sponsored by the famous Froncysyllte Male Voice Choir). The feedback from the audience was that *"it was an excellent concert, despite being under pressure after an extensive tour, the Toronto Welsh Male Voice Choir gave a first class performance"*.

The final day before the flight home was spent at Llandudno, where the members and supporters enjoyed last minute shopping in this beautiful Victorian seaside resort.

The consensus was it had been a wonderful trip enjoyed by all.

The Toronto Welsh Male Voice Choir would like to thank two very talented young ladies, Bronwen Low and Kelly Campbell who accompanied the choir to Wales and who helped to make it a very memorable tour.

Tried, and liked, the pumpkin pie – Welsh version from last month’s Gadwyn. Here’s another idea for using the remains of Halloween’s Jack O’ Lantern *(or you could use canned pumpkin). This soup is rich and creamy, but only use milk. Parsley can be substituted for the cilantro

(Recipe from a restaurant in Huntsville, Ontario named “3 Guys and a Stove”)

1 ½	tsp olive oil	1	tsp fresh chopped garlic
1	cup finely chopped red onion	2½	cups of chicken stock
1	large sweet potato, peeled and chopped	1	cup cooked mashed pumpkin
¾	tsp each: cumin and turmeric (or ½ tsp curry powder)	½	tsp chopped cilantro
½	tsp ground ginger	1	tbsp honey
		¾	cup 2% milk

1. In a non-stick saucepan, cook garlic and red onion in hot oil until softened, about 5 minutes.
2. Add stock, sweet potato, pumpkin, cumin and turmeric (or curry powder), cilantro, honey and ginger. Cover and simmer until potatoes are tender, about 40 minutes.
3. Combine in processor or blender until smooth (soup may be refrigerated and kept this way up to four days).
4. To serve, heat up soup slowly adding enough milk to achieve desired consistency (about ¾ cup). Serve hot in heated bowls, garnished with additional chopped cilantro. Yield 5.

Excerpt from Memories of Christmas by Dylan Thomas

“Bring out the tall tales now that we told by the fire as we roasted chestnuts and the gaslight bubbled low. Ghosts with their heads under their arms trailed their chains and said ‘whooh’ like owls in the long nights when I dared not look over my shoulder; wild beasts lurked in the cubby-hole under the stairs where the gas-meter ticked. ‘Once upon a time,’ Jim said, ‘there were three boys, just like us, who got lost in the dark snow, near Bethesda Chapel, and this is what happened to them ...’ It was the most dreadful happening I had ever heard.

And I remember that we went singing carols once, a night or two before Christmas Eve, when there wasn’t the shaving of a moon to light the secret, white-flying streets. At the end of a long road was a drive that led to a large house, and we stumbled up the darkness of the drive that night, each one of us afraid, each one holding a stone in his hand in case, and all of us too brave to say a word. The wind made through the drive-trees noises as of old and unpleasant and maybe web-footed men wheezing in caves. We reached the black bulk of the house.

‘What shall we give them?’ Dan whispered.

“‘Hark the Herald’?” “‘Christmas comes but Once a Year’?”

‘No,’ Jack said: ‘We’ll sing “Good King Wenceslas.” I’ll count three.

One, two three, and we began to sing, our voices high and seemingly distant in the snow-felted darkness round the house that was occupied by nobody we knew. We stood close together, near the dark door.

Good King Wencelas looked out
On the Feast of Stephen.

And then small, dry voice, like the voice of someone who has not spoken for a long time, suddenly joined our singing: a small, dry voice from the other side of the door: a small, dry voice through the keyhole. And when we stopped running we were outside *our* house; the front room was lovely and bright; the gramophone was playing; we saw the red and white balloons hanging from the gas-bracket; uncles and aunts sat by the fire; I thought I smelt our supper being fried in the kitchen. Everything was good again, and Christmas shone through all the familiar town.

‘Perhaps it was a ghost,’ Jim said.

‘Perhaps it was trolls,’ Dan said, who was always reading.

‘Let’s go in and see if there’s any jelly left,’ Jack said.

And we did that.
