Same sex marriage/union issue – the Dewi Sant Perspective.

In preparation for the inevitable passing of the legislation concerning same sex weddings members of Dewi Sant Welsh United Church made a request to discuss the matter and to decide what the consensus was about such a service being held at the Church. The meeting was arranged for Sunday May 15th, and this is a précis of the content of the meeting :

It was decided that I should arrange and direct the discussion. Therefore I prepared a short introduction presenting the facts and background of the legislation, then those present were grouped in numbers of 6-8 people for discussion on three main questions, in preparation for a discussion to follow. The questions posed were :

- 1. What are the main arguments for and against the legal union of same sex Partners?*
- 2. What are the arguments for and against the union of same sex partners from a Christian perspective?*
- 3. Would you feel comfortable being present at a same sex wedding at the Church?*

The reaction to the first question went along the lines of :

- a. ***The legal rights of a married couple and the material gains as they stand at present discriminate against same sex partners.***
- b. ***The term 'marriage' was raised as an issue***
- c. ***The term 'equal marriage' referring only to same sex marriage was an issue***
- d. ***Some believe that the term referring to such marriages should read 'same gender union'***
- e. ***It was agreed that the issue will remain for a long time before the details will be sorted out***

On the second question these were the main reactions :

- a. ***Some argued that when Christ spoke of marriage he referred directly to an union of man and woman .***
- b. ***The Church has included procreation as one of the main reasons for marriage. Same-sex marriage cannot physically include procreation, therefore it cannot be accepted in the same way as 'traditional' marriage.***
- c. ***It was argued that the term for a Church same-sex wedding should change, to something like 'holy union'.***
- d. ***Others noted that the state of marriage has always reflected social structure, and that Jesus referred to this in his teaching.***
- e. ***It was also argued that God created us as we are. Therefore to treat some members of society as outcasts and to deny them equal opportunities simply because they are 'different' is an insult to God.***

The third question was more direct, and the reactions were varied and opposed :

- a. ***Many argued that if the teaching about Love is central to the Christian ideal, then why should we, as a Church, oppose the union of two people who love one another and who wish to commit their lives to one another.***
- b. ***Others argued that their traditional values could not include the idea of same-sex weddings in a Church, that they would feel uncomfortable in such a situation, although they had no opposition to the idea of a legal union which would defend all people under the Constitution.***

It was agreed that Dewi Sant Welsh United Church would allow a same-sex marriage ceremony to take place at the Church, as long as the minister was prepared to carry out the ceremony and as long as the ceremony reflected Christian values and that the wedding would not create hurt or emotional pain to the Church members. Some said that they would not attend a same-sex marriage until they had become more 'comfortable' with such a ceremony, but they would not stand in the way of progress.

Thank you to all those who attended the meeting and for the graceful and sympathetic way the matters were discussed. We could not and would not agree on all the matters and details, but we all left the Church that day in a spirit of friendship and accord. Deian.

A Rugby Invasion of North America.

Sometimes I can't believe my good luck. When I answered the phone a few weeks ago, little did I think that I would be asked to fly to New York City to chaperone 77 Welsh rugby supporters!!

Wales' success on the rugby pitch this past season has ensured that their loyal supporters would not abandon them just because their next two games were in North America. So, despite the fact that eleven of the victorious Grand Slam team had gone to New Zealand with the Lions, the remainder would still be feted and cheered on by their fans.

Rugby crowds are always great fun. We laughed and joked our way through NYC - but, boy! did they ever take their rugby seriously. I was quite astonished to learn how many of them had followed the Welsh team all over the world. It was fascinating to overhear conversations in the hotel bar that first night: "Didn't we meet in Argentina, or was it South Africa?" "Weren't you on the New Zealand trip?" I hope the Welsh team appreciates that these rugby fanatics follow them wherever.

I knew no-one. But, it didn't take long before links were formed. "Do you know my cousin in Caerfyrddin?" "Know him? I had lunch with him last week!"

My first assignment was for four days only, but I was quite determined that from the moment that I met them in JFK airport we were not going to waste one precious moment in that most exciting of cities!

Our stay in New York City was, of course, action packed. We did the usual - Empire State, Grand Central Station (renovated in 1990 by a Cardiff architect), Times Square, shopping, sorting out contact lenses problem, a boat trip around Manhattan, Greenwich Village to have a drink at Dylan Thomas' old pub - The White Horse - and that was just the first day! Ground Zero was extremely emotional even for the most macho of these rugby enthusiasts. Therefore, to take our minds off the sadder matters, some serious shopping was essential. Canal Street in Chinatown and Little Italy were the next stops. I was rather pleased with my \$8 "Pashmina"!!

In order to experience a sport other than rugby, we arranged to go to a Mets baseball game. For me, personally, it's more exciting to watch paint dry, but off we went! I forget the result, but the home team won (I think!)

All too soon the 77 supporters climbed on the coaches en route for Hartford, Connecticut for the Wales v. U.S. match. I was not to meet up with them again until they arrived in Toronto for the Canada v. Wales game. The anticipation of this International event had been mounting for weeks. There were official lunches and dinners, team practices at Appleby College - a local

private school- and unofficial lunches and barbecues with the headmaster. The first game of the weekend was Rhydfelin v. Brampton on Friday, and by the end of the evening we were all in the right mood for the BIG GAME on Saturday.

Despite the intense heat, the hardiest supported the earlier Cardiff v Ontario match and attended the morning's mini rugby. Two of "our guys" wore not only their Grand Slam supporters' shirts but also some rather unusual headgear! One sported a huge black curly wig. His friend looked like a Welsh Viking with red, white and green horns protruding from his cap. Those of us not quite as heat-tolerant sought shelter (and free refreshments!) in one of the many Hospitality tents.

By the time the almost 13,000 were in their seats, the atmosphere was electric. With red being the official color of both Wales and Canada it was difficult to decide who was supporting whom. But since there are an estimated 45,000 Welsh people in the Greater Toronto Area, I wouldn't like to take any bets.

I am no rugby aficionado but in my opinion the first twenty minutes or so were nail-biting and Canada gave the favorites a run for their money. The 40+ degree heat in the stadium should have given the Canadians the upper hand, but as the final results show, (Wales 60, Canada 3), that was not the case.

At the official post match dinner Trevor Jones, Honorary President of Rugby Canada, welcomed and congratulated both teams. In Wales we are accustomed to "caps" being awarded for International matches, and two new Welsh "caps" were presented that evening to Matthew Jones and Chris Czekaj. In Canada, however, this has not been the custom - up until now. It was very satisfying to watch caps being presented to first time Canadian players, with the promise that caps would also awarded retroactively.

So much emotion and enjoyment in one day! When all 77 of us returned to our hotel that evening I assumed that we would either have a quiet night cap at the bar or else retire to our rooms. No way! Yes, we all did rush to the bar, and, yes, we all did order a large drink. Then.... we settled down to watch a recording of the Lions' match played earlier that day! As I said, they take their rugby seriously!

Departures at any airport are always emotional, and I fought to hold back the tears as I waved goodbye to my new friends. It had been a superb experience, and if the Welsh supporters enjoyed themselves half as much as I did, it was a trip to remember for ever.

Kitchen Corner ----- **Cornel Fach Y Gegin.**

Fish Week is held every year in Pembrokeshire. This year the theme was flat fish all of which are plentiful from May to March. Flat fish lend themselves to Paupiettes, little rolled up parcels stuffed with something delicious, which can be baked, poached or roasted. They are easy for elegant party fare, (stuffed with prawns) or just comfort food (with lots of cheese and breadcrumbs). Some of the thicker variety of fish can be rolled gently with a rolling pin. There is a great variety to choose from---sole, plaice, flounder, turbot, dab, megrim and witch. Some of these are not so familiar here in Canada.

Paupiettes of Plaice for Four.

8 to 12 fillets of plaice, depending on size and appetite: 8 oz of prawns roughly chopped:
2 lbs. Of spinach: 4 oz of whole peeled prawns: 1 pint of cheese sauce: 2oz. of butter:
Parmesan cheese: A little milk: 3 desert spoons of flour.

Method.

Make the cheese sauce by melting the butter and adding 3 desert spoons of flour. Stir until the mixture forms a small ball, then add a tiny drop of milk. Keep adding milk, but in between each addition of milk make sure that the mixture comes away clean from the edge of the pan. Repeat this until you have a smooth thickish cream. If you want it to be richer, you can add a dollop of cream! Add 3 to 4 oz of grated cheese. The choice is yours. You can add a few drops of Tabasco if you want to give it a bit of a kick.

Take a spoon or two of the sauce and bind the chopped prawns with it. Divide the mixture between the fillets of fish.

Put the spinach in a pan, pour boiling water over it then bring it back quickly to the boil, drain immediately, squeezing as much of the liquid out as you can. Chop the spinach quite finely and layer the bottom of a buttered ovenproof dish. Layer the rolled fish fillets, seam side down, pour the sauce over and sprinkle with Parmesan cheese.

Bake in a medium hot oven for half an hour ---- until it is golden and bubbling. Serve with new potatoes, warm crisp bread, along with a side dish of sliced tomatoes with lots of fresh chopped parsley and some fine red onions in good vinaigrette. This dish is far simpler than it sounds. Any flat fish can be done like this. Instead of prawns, chop shallots and onions. The fish can also be poached in a white wine sauce, hollandaise or even béarnaise sauce.

Sole Surprise is another classic variation for a special event. I have the recipe for that if anyone would like it.

In response to Myfanwy's memories of Gwynfor Evans and David Cox's eloquent testimony to him, I have very happy memories of Gwynfor's visit to the Welsh communities of North America in, I think, 1958. I was president of the St. David's Society at the time, and Gwynfor stayed at our home in Scarborough for two nights when he visited Toronto and spoke at Dewi Sant. I was very much in awe of him, and felt very honoured that he was our house guest, but he put my wife Betty and me completely at ease, and he was wonderful with our little one-year-old daughter Beth. What a great man he was !

Almost 40 years later, in 1996, after we had moved to California from Waterloo, Ontario , Dafydd Wigley MP (then leader of Plaid Cymru in the House of Commons), came to North America and was also our house-guest.

Dafydd spoke to a joint meeting of the Welsh Society of the Monterey Peninsula (of which I was and am vice-president) and of the World Affairs Council of Monterey Bay, of which I was also an officer. He spoke very movingly about Wales and the aspirations of its people for self-government.

The WAC evaluates all its guest speakers and I learned later that Dafydd had received the highest ratings of any of its speakers for the past several years. He brought the house down by stating, at the beginning of his address, that someone had once defined the Welsh as ".the Irish who couldn't swim" ! We found Dafydd, like Gwynfor, to be both charming and modest. Wales has been fortunate to have had leaders of their calibre.

I was saddened to learn of the death of Siwsann George at such a young age. I first met her when I was visiting friends in Trebefered (Boverton) in the beautiful Vale of Glamorgan, and we attended a Mabsant concert one summer evening in Llanilltyd Fawr (Llantwit Major) to raise funds for the nearby Welsh-language primary school in, I believe, Y Bontfaen (Cowbridge). Siwsann and her colleagues put on a wonderful concert. By coincidence, I met her again a few weeks later when the group were touring North America. To my amazement, she recognised me and we gave each other a big hug !

What a delight it was to revisit Dewi Sant this past spring; I was fortunate enough to meet Rev. Evans and his loyal staff. A few days later I was able to pay an all-too-brief visit to the Welsh Festival in Stratford, where I met Deian again and had the pleasure of meeting Mrs. Evans. I saw my old friends May and Albert Hale and Geraint Jones and his lovely wife Lyn, reintroduced myself to Myfanwy Bajaj and met Hefina Phillips, whom I greatly admire because of her stalwart efforts, over the years, on behalf of the Welsh language.
