Eisteddfod Dewi Sant 2007.

One more special event over and what could be more special or traditionally Welsh than an Eisteddfod? It has been a long time since we have held such an event at Dewi Sant and therefore there was a great deal of excitement and anticipation.

The categories were numerous and varied, as the organizers tried to ensure that there was "something for everyone"- cooking, crafts, flower arranging, art and photography, as well as the more traditional literary, musical and recitation competitions. Unfortunately, few children participated because the event clashed with March Break. (The organizers will be more careful in future!) However, the children that did compete just delighted us all. 3 year old Katie Quesnelle won the first prize for her innovatively decorated peanut butter and jelly sandwich. Also her recitation (complete with props- a wall and a caterpillar) was so enjoyable that we insisted that she repeat the performance. Fortunately, the morning's emcee, the Rev. Deian Evans, was totally flexible in his timetabling, so when 3 year old Madison Carys Freemantle took some time to overcome her shyness, we were still treated to another version of "Who's that tickling my back?"

One of my personal highlights was to hear 8 year old Nia Contini's Welsh recitation. Her pronunciation was perfect-thanks to some coaching from her Nain! As a result of winning first prize in both the Welsh and English categories, she was the recipient of the Trophy for children's recitation.

Dewi Sant is fortunate to possess a large number of awards for various eisteddfod competitions, from the maker of the best Welsh cakes to the best literary entries. This year a new award, in memory of Elaine Kirkham, was presented to the best competitor in the Learners' category. Elaine had been one of the most enthusiastic and faithful students in the Toronto Welsh Learners' classes. I'm sure she would have been delighted that the new trophy was awarded to Angela Vitale, whose entry, "Llythyr o Toronto i Gymru yn 1907" (A letter from Toronto to Wales in 1907), was as excellent as any learner's work that the adjudicator had ever read. In fact, Angela was strongly advised to compete as a Learner in next year's National Eisteddfod.

One of the categories was an instrumental duet, and the only entries were John Otley (guitar) and the Rev. Deian Evans (mouth organ). Quite an unusual combination, wouldn't you agree?? Definitely never witnessed at any eisteddfod in Wales - but who's to know, such a duo might become a standard in future National Eisteddfodau!

It was an extremely enjoyable day. Everyone entered the spirit of the occasion and it was rewarding to see so many colourful ribbons sported by the proud winners. Thank you very much to everyone who made the event such a successful one - the planners, adjudicators, competitors, accompanists, refreshment providers and everyone who attended. A very special word of thanks goes to Annette Evans, without whom the day would not have flowed so smoothly. Diolch o galon, Annette.

Welsh Media coverage of Dewi Sant Church.

On Easter Sunday a programme was aired on BBC Radio Cymru about the centenary celebrations at Dewi Sant Church. Over the following few days further programmes on Welsh radio and TV mentioned the Church and its various spiritual and social impact upon the Welsh people of Toronto.

Since then the reaction from Wales has been astounding. Newspaper articles on the Church have been published in local "Papurau Bro" and also in the Caernarfon and Denbigh Herald. E mail messages and phone messages of good wishes have poured in to church and home, as well as enquiries about the church services by people wishing to worship here when they visit the city. Others wrote about their connections to Dewi Sant. One lady from Wales wrote about her grandfather who was a member at Clinton Street, and of course we sent her a picture of the original Church. Another lady told us about her uncle, Rev. R. J. Jones, from Anglesey who was the first minister of the Church, returning to his homeland in 1911 where he became one of the leading lights of the Pulpit in Wales. We responded by searching the Clinton Room at the Church for a picture of him, and his picture is also on its way to Wales.

The Church is well and truly in full public view this year, here in Toronto and also in Wales. Thank you to all those who participated, and especially those who organized and co-ordinated the visit of the reporters from BBC Wales. Many thanks go to Annette Evans for contacting Gwenfair Michael and encouraging her to come to Toronto to produce the programmes and be responsible for getting them out on the air.

Directions to Ferry Dock

The Toronto Ferry Docks is located at the foot of Bay Street and Queens Quay, just West of the Westin Harbour Castle Hotel.

Walk or Drive to Main entrance at foot of Bay St on Queens Quay. Enter through park and enter via walkway between Harbour Castle Westin Hotel and Harbour Castle condominiums. Parking is available 1 block north at Lakeshore and Bay, 1 block west on Queens Quay between Bay and York Sts, 1 block east opposite Toronto Star building adjacent to Captain Johns restaurant.

Ferry Leaves Ferry Dock at 9:30 and 10:00A.M.

Take the ferry from the foot of Bay Street to Wards Island or to Centre Island. Call the Ferry Docks (416-392-8193) for departure times or click on the Ferry Schedule. It’s about 15 minutes from Centre Island Dock to the church and about a 20-25 minute walk from the Ward’s Island Dock. Every Sunday, the church van meets the ferry arriving at the Ward’s Island dock around 10:00, so if you’d like a ride, take the ferry arriving at Ward’s before 10:00.

Do you ever get a hankering for a good Welsh pub--the kind that has delicious food and feels warm and inviting as soon as you walk through the door? If so, you may want to try The Cat and the Fiddle in Cobourg, Ontario. Cobourg and the neighbouring town of Port Hope make a very pleasant day trip, just an hour's drive east along the 401, and a meal at this pub is likely to be the highlight of your outing.

Two years ago, we bought some farmland in the rolling hills of Northumberland County and built a house overlooking Rice Lake for weekend getaways from Toronto. The unspoiled, historical nature of these towns was as strong an attraction as the lovely countryside and easy commute. Port Hope is said to have the best preserved 19th century streetscape in Ontario, and it's popular with antique hunters. Canada's last functioning "atmospheric theatre", the Capitol Theatre, puts on excellent productions. The heart of Cobourg is Victoria Hall, which was opened in 1860 by the Prince of Wales and named in honour of his mother. Its courtroom is modeled on that of the Old Bailey in London, and its grand concert hall is spectacular. If you continue to walk east along the main street (King Street) past the restaurants and shops, you'll soon come across a lovely park leading down to the boardwalk and beach.

While exploring downtown Cobourg one day, we happened upon a pub that was flying the Welsh flag, about a five minute walk from Victoria Hall. There was a large Welsh dragon painted on the patio's fence and Welsh Rugby League plaques on the walls. When we asked what the connection was, we were told the owners were Welsh. On a subsequent visit with my Welsh mother, Barrie Jones stopped by our table to greet her. Barrie and his wife Eira immigrated to Canada from Newport, South Wales in 1973. Eira had worked in pubs in Britain, as well as at The Feathers on Kingston Road in Toronto. Upon moving to Cobourg in 1983, they noticed the lack of British style pubs in the area, and started to look for a good location to open their own. They found an old building that had originally been the Cobourg dairy, just one block north of King Street, and opened The Cat and the Fiddle in 1985. The many Welsh items featured in the decoration were collected by the Joneses during visits home, or supplied by some of their regular customers.

The menu includes stuffed Yorkshire puddings, steak and kidney pie, shepherd's pie, Cornish pastie, fish and chips, as well as the usual Canadian favourites. It's reasonably priced (most of the British entrees are in the \$9-\$13 range) and the food is excellent. Sometimes you'll even find a Welsh dish among their specials. Be sure to leave room for a delicious dessert, such as sherry trifle or bread and butter pudding. Brunch is served on Sundays from 11:00-3:00. I won't comment on their selection of beers as this is a church publication, but you can rest assured that it's licensed! We've always found the service good and the atmosphere very family friendly. It has high chairs and a children's menu. The Cat and the Fiddle soon became a favourite spot for my husband, children and I to visit after a long day of amusing the locals with our efforts at farming! We hope you like it, too.

Cobourg is about 110 km. east of Toronto along the 401, then a five minute drive south of the highway exit. If you're commuting to the upcoming Welsh Festival in Kingston, a visit to Cobourg would break the journey without making much of a detour. To find the pub, you should take Exit # 474 off Hwy. 401, which is Division Street. Take it south, following the many signs for downtown or Victoria Hall on King Street. Just one block north of King Street, turn right onto Covert Street and look for the Welsh flag. Barrie says someone has "taken it as a souvenir", which often happens, but he plans to replace it soon! The pub is on your right, at 38 Covert Street. There's a parking lot with two hours of free parking across the street from the pub. Cobourg is also accessible by ViaRail.

If you drive west along Cobourg's main street (King Street), it becomes Hwy 2, the old highway between the towns of Port Hope and Cobourg. In 7 km, you'll arrive in Port Hope, and after exploring its historical downtown, you'll see several sign posted routes north to the 401.

Israel with Love.

March 8th we boarded the Air Canada plane bound for Israel. This was my sixth flight to Israel, three of those as Volunteer for Israel, yet I knew this would be the most memorable. My grandson Blake turned thirteen, the year of his bar mitzpha. March 9th we checked into a hotel near the Tel Aviv Marina and Sea Promenade. All the family gathered together and the tour began. I will list only a few sites we saw on our journey. We visited the ancient town of Beit Govrin, for an archeological dig at Tel Maresha. My friend Val, and myself, picked up our trowels, spades, and a large pail. We actually found broken pottery, including one fairly large piece of a jug, which caused great excitement. This archeological site is two thousand, two hundred years old. On to Latrun, visiting the Armoured Forces Museum. March 13th found us settled in the new city of Jerusalem. We visited Yad Vashem, Her Herzle, the Knesset. In the old city we strolled the Cardo, Kortel (western wall), the Herodian Mansions, and Rabbinical Tunnel.

March 15th, the day of the bar mitzpha, we were surrounded by the Judean Hills, in a place called Genesis Land. My daughter Audrey and Graham stood by Blake's side while he beautifully read his Hebrew portion. There was a part in the service for his brother Cole, age ten years, and sister Madison, age seven. Both grandfathers read Hebrew prayers, and my other daughter Alexandria was included, making this an incredible experience for me. We spent our final days in Eilat, in a hotel a few minutes from Aqabah, Jordan, near Saudi Arabia, and on the other side of us, the Sinai Desert and Egypt. I believe everyone should visit Israel at least once during their lifetime. One feels the history of the Bible wherever one walks, or whatever hills your eyes view. Truly, there is beauty everywhere. Shalom – Heddwch!
