

The North American Festival of Wales, Washington.

Quite a large contingent from the Toronto area attended this year's Gymanfa weekend in Washington. Was it merely the location that attracted so many of us, or was it anything to do with the fact that Cor Meibion Maelgwn, under the leadership of Trystan Lewis, just happened to be the guest choir??

The venue was perfect: an excellent hotel on the edge of historic Alexandria - not within walking distance but with a frequent free shuttle service to the old town. Perfect for those of us who love to shop! It was an easy drive into the capital city and its infinite attractions. Too much to see and do in too short a time.

The weekend's events began with a concert given by Dafydd Iwan- possibly the most famous of current Welsh entertainers. His fame as a language activist is legendary and he used his songs to promote his fight for the rights of Wales. Much of what we take for granted today, such as bi-lingual road signs and official recognition for the language, we owe to Dafydd Iwan and the committed activists of that era. He remains incredibly energetic and willingly continued his singing after official events were over.

The highlight of Friday evening was the Grand Banquet and Concert at which Ottawa's own Sharon Mercer was the soloist. Not only is she a totally delightful person, she has the voice of an angel and thoroughly deserved the standing ovation we gave her.

Saturday night was our chance to hear Cor Meibion Maelgwn. Readers of Y Gadwyn who attended the OGGA in Stratford two years ago will be very familiar with this great choir and its charismatic leader. We were not disappointed. With Sharon as their soloist, they treated us to a musical feast and Trystan, their conductor, had us all eating out of his hand!! (Excuse the double metaphor!)

On Sunday morning the Rev. Richard Baskwill delivered the bi-lingual sermon "Dyma'r Ffordd. Rhodiwch ynddi!" (This is the way, walk in it) Although the afternoon Gymanfa Session was to start at 2.30 P.M, the diehard

altos and sopranos were in place well before 2 o'clock! (As we had staked our claim earlier we didn't need to be there quite so early for the evening session!) We sang our hearts out. No Gymanfa in Wales could produce a better sound. It was truly wonderful. Backed by his choir and with Sharon as soloist in both sessions, Trystan commanded our attention and brought out the very best in us musically.

What else went on during the weekend? A great deal! The Eisteddfod has become an integral part of the Festival. Myfanwy Bajaj and her committee had provided a wide variety of competitions. Lord Roger Roberts, visiting from Wales, adjudicated the English literary entries and the Welsh and English recitations. Trystan Lewis was the adjudicator of all the music categories and Hefina Phillips of the Welsh and Learners' literary competitions. The highlight of the annual Festival Eisteddfod is the David Morris Award whereby the winner receives \$3,000 in order to compete in the National Eisteddfod in Wales. Unfortunately, this year the first prize was withheld due to lack of competition. Nancy Wright, the only competitor, was highly commended and sang a solo at Y Gymanfa...

There were also ten different seminars. Attendees could learn about subjects as diverse as the Mabinogion, Welsh Pirates, Poetry of Gwyn Thomas or Welsh for Beginners. In between the events we also visited the Market Place, where a large variety of Welsh items were for sale. Some of us also managed the odd tourist trip around the Capital City.

Any complaints? None whatsoever! A truly great experience. Kudos to all who made it happen. Hefina Phillips.

"Dafydd Iwan is the newest most original discovery in Welsh folk singing. He has created a tremendous following, perhaps the first modern Welsh language singer to become a teenage idol. These words are taken from the sleeve of **Dafydd's first record**, "Y **Dydd**" which I have here on my desk. *Myfanwy*. I had the **honour** of spending an hour or so with Dafydd in Washington. An honour, because his lyrics have, over the years helped me get through some difficult times in my life... I felt it important to let him know the influence his words have on people. I was able to tell him how others had shared their feelings with me of the spiritual/ emotional effect his words have had on them. (even "Carlo," tongue in cheek!!) A gentleman doctor sat with me in the afterglow one night, with tears streaming down his face; profoundly moved as he listened to Dafydd singing... Isn't it wonderful that years after that first record, I was sitting with someone who has "lived his dream." Dafydd has lived through trials and tribulations, through joys and sorrows and tremendous successes. He is **now** able to lecture with confidence and pride on how the Welsh language has been saved and of how it has a bright future **now.** This legend has fought with every breath in his body for the language and country that he loves so much. This is a man who has fought for what he believes in and who has never given up. "Fought" is a strange word to

so. He is invited back over and over again to perform the favourites. This must give him a great sense of

satisfaction as he throws back his head, closes his eyes and just lets the music carry him away.

In 1802 a remarkable woman, Augusta Waddington, was born in the house of Ty Uchaf (Upper House) not far from the town of Abergavenny (Y Fenni) in the southeastern Welsh county of Monmouthshire (now known by its traditional Welsh name of Gwent). Augusta was the daughter of an English businessman who had become wealthy through business dealings in London and the United States. Augusta's mother had some Welsh blood in her however and, although born into a wealthy English-speaking family, Augusta always considered herself to be Welsh.

In those days, at the beginning of the nineteenth century Eastern Gwent, which adjoins the English border and seems very "English" to many visitors today, was almost entirely Welsh-speaking even though English was making inroads. (Gwent villages with present-day, English-sounding names were Welsh-speaking. For example, one of the great Welsh educators

Gruffydd Jones's circulating schools, where adult men and women were taught to read and write in Welsh – making Wales the most literate country in Europe in the 18th century – was in Llanwynell. Today it's listed on maps as Wolves Newton).

Augusta learned Welsh as a child when visiting her father's tenants in their cottages and, as a young woman, developed an increasingly enthusiastic interest in Welsh literature and all aspects of Welsh culture. She was married in 1823 to Benjamin Hall, whose wealthy family owned coal-mines in the Abercarn area of western Gwent. Sir Benjamin (he was knighted a few years later and became Minister of Works) was an intelligent and open-minded man who not only supported his wife in her Welsh cultural activities but opened a Welsh church for his Abercarn workers. As Minister of Works he commissioned the building of a clock-tower for the **Houses of Parliament**; it was named "Big Ben" after him. Later still Queen Victoria bestowed the title of "Lord Llanover" on him.

Augusta was unquestionably a privileged member of the British upper class. As a child she played with the daughters of the then king (George III) and was subsequently a friend of the Prince of Wales (later George IV). She and her husband maintained a town house in London and travelled extensively throughout Britain and Europe.

What differentiated her from most of her English (and anglicized Welsh) fellow-members of the landed gentry in Wales was her passionate love of all things Welsh. Lady Llanover was a strong supporter of eisteddfodau in Y Fenni (where there was a flourishing Welsh cultural society, Cymreigyddion y Fenni), and elsewhere. At the National Eisteddfod of Wales, held in Cardiff in 1834 she adopted the bardic name "Gwenynen Gwent" ("The Bee of Gwent"), chosen to indicate that she was " as busy as a bee" in her support of Welsh causes. She revived interest in the Welsh triple harp and traditional. She ensured that all the workers on her estate were Welsh-speaking and encouraged her female employees to wear Welsh dress. She also took a leading part in the movement to preserve Welsh manuscripts and established a flock of black Welsh mountain sheep on her estate.

Lady Llanover survived her husband by thirty years. She died in 1896 at the age of 93. Reporting her funeral, the local newspaper wrote: "At her expressed wish, the solemn rites observed yesterday at Llanover....were conducted entirely, from first to last, in the language of the people of Wales".

Today, despite more than two centuries of Anglicization, there are signs that the people of Gwent are beginning to cherish their Welsh heritage once again. An increasing number of schools in which Welsh is the medium of instruction (but in which all children are also fluent in English and, often, in one or two European languages in addition) now exist in the county. These days it's not uncommon to meet multilingual Welsh speaking children and teenagers from Y Fenni, Newport, (Casnewydd) and Chepstow (Casgwent), which is located on the English border. IN MEMORIAM------ER PARCHUS GOF.

ON JANUARY 17th, 2007 A BELOVED LADY PASSED AWAY AT YORK CENTRAL HOSPITAL IN RICHMOND HILL, ONTARIO WITHIN DAYS OF HER 88th BIRTHDAY. EIRA MEIRION THOMAS WAS BORN EIRA MEIRION ROBERTS ON JANUARY 24th, 1919 IN Y BALA, MEIRIONYDD, WALES, THE DAUGHTER OF JOHN AND ELUNED ROBERTS AND CAME TO CANADA IN THE 1940's.

EIRA'S LINEAGE HAD HISTORICAL TIES TO THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF WALES, HER FATHER WAS THE PRECENTOR FOR MANY YEARS AT CAPEL TEGID WELSH PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH. ONE OF THE GREAT BARDS IN NINETEENTH CENTURY WALES, DAVID ROBERTS (DEWI HAVHESP) WAS HER GREAT GRANDFATHER. FURTHER BACK HER GRAND PARENTAL LINEAGE WERE WILLIAM EDWARDS WRITER OF MANY WELSH HYMNS, ONE OF WHICH THE FIRST LINE READS "DOES NEB OND EF FY IESU HARDD" AND THE REVEREND JOHN EVANS, ADWY'R CLAWDD (1723—1853). BOTH THESE GENTLEMEN WERE OF GREAT HELP AND BENEFIT TO THE REVEREND THOMAS CHARLES OF Y BALA.

EIRA BECAME A MEMBER OF DEWI SANT WELSH CHURCH ON ARRIVING IN CANADA AND MET HER FUTURE HUSBAND DAVID DANIEL THOMAS OF CYDWELI. THEY WERE FAITHFUL ATTENDERS AT CLINTON STREET UNTIL MOVING TO THE AREA OF KLEINBURG IN THE LATE FIFTIES AND BECAME MEMBERS AT TESTON UNITED CHURCH WHERE EIRA PLAYED THE ORGAN FOR SEVERAL YEARS.

Leek, Cranberry and Chestnut Circle.

Ingredients. 3 large leeks: 1 large red onion: 1 red pepper roughly chopped: 4 cloves of garlic finely chopped:

1 lb. cooked chestnuts (canned ones are ideal): 8 oz. Cranberries: 6oz.white bread crumbs: 2 tablespoons of finely chopped parsley: 3 well beaten eggs: 1lb. Cox apples coarsely grated: 6oz.of goat cheese, crumbled, (or any other soft cheese of your choice): 4oz. mushrooms cut very

finely 2oz. butter: To decorate you will need a few cranberries, rosemary and bay leaves.

Cranberry sauce.

1lb.of cranberries: 8oz. of soft brown sugar: ½ pint of port wine: ½ pint of orange juice; the peel of 1 orange grated.

In a large frying pan heat the butter, then gently sauté the mushrooms, garlic and onions. Method.

In a large mixing bowl put the chestnuts very finely chopped with the onion mixture from the frying

pan, 8 oz. of cranberries, breadcrumbs, parsley, apples, the beaten eggs, pepper and salt to taste. Mix thoroughly

Soak the leeks well. Slice them lengthwise. Remove each leaf and wash separately. Place the leeks in a saucepan of boiling water and boil gently for 1-2 minutes. Drain thoroughly and put in cold water. Drain again and dry very carefully with kitchen paper.

Grease a Savarin 24cm/9½" bowl with butter. Fill the mold with the leek leaves making sure that they overlap.

Put half of the cranberry mixture in with the leeks and press firmly. Now press the cheese over all this. Add the rest of the cranberry mixture and press very very firmly. Now add the remaining leeks Make sure that there are no spaces or holes.

Bake for 40-45 minutes at 400F or regulo 6.

Allow to cool the turn out onto a serving dish and decorate.

To make the sauce. Put all the ingredients into a saucepan, ie.1lb of cranberries etc. Simmer, and stir until the sauce becomes thick.

Serve with roast potatoes and of course turkey or other meat of your choice Enjoy, Myfanwy. Good luck. I am going to try to make this for Thanksgiving. Ram will probably have to clean the kitchen for a week after my efforts!!!

Lupus.

As one of the several people suffering from Lupus in Dewi Sant, I asked if I could include a short paragraph in Y Gadwyn. Many do not know anything about this disease.

Lupus can be a very debilitating disease, which takes many forms, most of them very painful and is a clever "imitator." It can be very difficult to diagnose, although it is a great deal easier to do so than 20 years ago.

Lupus impacts over 50.000 Canadians with the majority being young women in their childbearing years. But younger and older people are being diagnosed with lupus as well. Lupus really is the *Disease of a Thousand Faces.*
