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## **OUTREACH 2008 – Daily Bread Food Bank Project**

7,000 lbs! That’s how much food Dewi Sant Church sorted at the Daily Bread Food Bank on Wednesday, April 23<sup>rd</sup>. Thanks to your generous donations over the past four weeks, Dewi Sant was also able to give 720 lbs. of food to the Food Bank.

Seventeen members and friends participated at the Food Bank in our first group outreach program. Thanks to Donna Morris, who organized the event, participants had a very rewarding day.

The day started at 10:45am as people arrived at the Food Bank. After signing in, Dewi Sant ‘workers’ had a tour of the facility and a mini-workshop. Then the sorting began. At a nominal fee of \$2 per person, the food bank also provided lunch.

In the workshop, everyone learned something new. Did you know that the number of people accessing the food banks in the Greater Toronto Area (GTA) has increased by 80% in the last 10 years? Only 2% of people using the food bank are homeless. A large proportion of food bank clients have an income that is half the poverty line (poverty line = \$20 - \$25 thousand per annum for an individual). After paying for rent and utilities, the average food bank recipient has \$6.61 per day.

Food Bank clients fall into the following categories:

- Working Poor
- Homeless
- Children
- Disabled
- Jobless
- New Immigrants
- Single Parents
- Seniors
- Students
- Welfare

A disturbing fact is that children comprise 34% of recipients at the Food Bank. Another little known fact is that 27% of the people who use food banks have a college or university education.

The Daily Bread Food Bank donates 1 million pounds of food a month through 191 agencies in the GTA. Twenty percent of donations come from individuals and non-corporate organizations. Eighty percent of donations are from Industry. Of the 80%, 10% is through reclamation. For example, grocery stores donate unsold food from shelves and unsuccessful product lines (remember purple ketchup?).

The Food Bank has a cafeteria, run by three qualified chefs, which provides 2,000 meals a week to agencies and meal programs. They also serve 150 meals a day to clients accessing the Food Bank. The cafeteria also offers a 16-week Chef course to Food Bank clients, which will qualify them to apply for work in restaurants and other cafeterias.

The Food Bank does not receive Government funding and this is deliberate. As an independent organization in charge of their own funds, they are uniquely positioned to apply the necessary pressure on the Government for change in health and social issues, as they relate to hunger. In 2007, the Food Bank was successful in influencing the Provincial Government decision to amend the Child Benefit Act, which raised the child subsidy to \$92 per child in a family. They are also continually involved in many

other poverty reduction goals for children, people with disabilities, and immigrants, to name just a few groups.

The Dewi Sant volunteers worked together like a well-oiled machine, unloading the containers of donated food, checking expiration dates and packing conditions, and sorting it into the appropriate boxes for the warehouse. At 3:30pm, Dewi Sant volunteers stopped and team leaders overseeing the sorting tables were very impressed with the amount of food sorted by the group. Participants felt good about it too. Not only had they helped an important cause, they had had fun doing it.

The Outreach Committee wishes to thank the many people who donated to the food drive. Also a big vote of thanks to the volunteers, who participated in the event. The old adage “many hands make light work” was never better demonstrated.

Finally, the committee wants to express their gratitude and appreciation to Donna Morris for doing an outstanding job of organizing this project for Dewi Sant.

There is definitely another such project in Dewi Sant’s future. In the meantime, remember that the Lansing basket needs your food donations too and stay tuned to the Outreach bulletin board in the fellowship hall for more news.

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## **Outreach Visit to the Toronto Christian Resource Centre**

We were invited to a “Lunch and Learn” event at the Toronto Christian Resource Centre on April 15<sup>th</sup>. Four members from Dewi Sant Welsh United Church attended and were served a nutritious lunch as we met members from other churches who had come to find out more about the work of the Centre. We were introduced to the staff, and members of the Board told us a little of the history and structure of the CRC.

The Director, Debra Dineen, then told us about the History, Vision and Mission as well as on-going renovations at Regent Park, illustrated with facts and pictures, and followed by a walk around the area. We learned that their mission is *‘Helping people help themselves’* which they have been doing for over 40 years. As well as the Drop-In centre, where 200 people are fed daily, they help the homeless find affordable shelter, develop skills, teach English and give spiritual support to those in need. With the major redevelopment of Regent Park plans for relocating and supporting the longterm residents has put a huge financial and social strain on all concerned with the CRC, including the United Church.

This event was part of the CRC’s (Christian Resource Centre) process of making a strong effort to reach out and connect with all the congregations in South Presbytery. This is one of the projects we will consider for Dewi Sant’s Outreach.

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### **Cornel Fach Y Gegin.      Kitchen Corner. Cream of Apple and Parsnip Soup.**

#### **Ingredients.**

2 tablespoons unsalted butter: 1 tablespoon olive oil: 1 large leek, trimmed, split and rinsed well. Use both white and green parts: 1 clove of garlic minced: 1 teaspoon of curry powder: ½ teaspoon of coriander powder: 2 tablespoons of all purpose flour: 2 apples peeled cored and chopped: 2 parsnips, peeled and chopped into 1 inch pieces: ½ teaspoon of salt: ¼ teaspoon of white pepper: 3 cups of chicken or vegetable soup: 1 cup table cream or whole milk: ¼ cup of fresh parsley chopped: 1 cup of croutons.

#### **Method.**

In a large saucepan, combine butter with oil and melt over medium heat. Add leeks and sauté until softened—about 4 minutes. Add garlic and cook for another minute, then stir in curry powder, coriander and flour. Cook for another 2 to 3 minutes.

Add apples, parsnips, salt and pepper. Mix well and add the broth, stirring the mixture to loosen any bits on the bottom of the pan. Increase the heat and bring the mixture to a boil. When fully boiling reduce the heat and let simmer for 20 to 25 minutes or until the vegetables are tender. Carefully transfer the mixture to a blender or food processor. Do this in batches if need be. Puree until mixture is smooth. Wipe the saucepan clean then return the blended soup to it. Place over a low heat. Add cream or milk and heat gently. Do not allow the soup to come to a boil.

Serve the soup and garnish with chopped parsley and croutons

## Queso Blanco Salsa

### Ingredients.

1/2 cup commercial Mexican-style red salsa  
2 scallions, chopped  
1 tablespoon chopped fresh cilantro (coriander)  
1/2 cup canned roasted red peppers, chopped  
8 ounces low-fat cream cheese (Neufchatel), I use regular Philadelphia cream cheese.

### Method.

Mix all ingredients together in a saucepan. Gently heat, stirring occasionally, until hot. Serve hot on warm dishes, or chill for 30 minutes to use as a dip for chips or crudités. Refrigerated and tightly sealed, Queso Blanco Salsa will keep for about two weeks.

**Albert Hale – a tribute.**

Albert Hale passed away on Friday, June 13<sup>th</sup>, leaving a legacy of wonderful memories to all who knew him. To know him was to respect him.

Here are some of those memories that I will hold dear.

Albert the Poet – he was famous as a poet, and was honoured as such at the highest levels. Two years ago his poem was deemed the best at the North America Eisteddfod at Cincinnati. This Eisteddfod sets the standard which gives to a poet the title 'Top Anglo Welsh American Poet'. The level of competition that year was very high, with five poems considered worthy of the first place, but Albert's poem stood head and shoulders above the rest.

Albert the Family man – Sixty two years married to May. Quite a record! After a whirlwind romance they were married in 1945, just days before he was billeted as a subscribed soldier. He and May were so compatible. They knew what the other thought, so it seemed. They faced good times and sad, joy and tragedy together, as a team. A wonderful, caring, sharing, loving team.

Albert the faithful to his Church – He and May passed numerous churches on their way down to Dewi Sant Church on a Sunday morning, but considered none other as an option for their place of worship. Albert was a conscientious supporter of our Church for decades, sitting on various committees, serving the Lord with dignity and purpose. At these meetings others would listen and follow his advice and opinions because he was held in such regard and respect. Albert served as Clerk of Session for some years.

We will also remember Albert as an honest worker, one with a beautiful singing voice, one with a smile and a twinkle that radiated joy, and as a true friend.

I will also remember Albert as one who had no fear.

On the afternoon of the day Albert passed away he and I held hands and shared a prayer. He was fully aware of what was going on. He was fully aware of the fate that awaited him. As we prayed he looked, unblinking, beyond me towards the One who shared our prayer. There was not a flicker of fear in those eyes, simply joy. He knew where he was going, and the road ahead held no fear or danger – ‘For Thou art with me, thy rod and thy staff they comfort me’

We who are left to grieve, may we gain strength from such faith as Albert possessed.

John had by this time gained a very high level position in his career and had many connections in Ottawa. Through John’s tireless efforts The Government of Canada became very well known as it was the only government to eventually support these veterans. John travelled to all the provinces lobbying for aid. Most of these men were badly injured, suffering from mental, emotional and physical problems. Gradually the small pension gained by John for them grew. He leaves behind very many families in Canada who are thankful for his untiring work on their behalf.

## Of Interest .....The Basques and the Welsh.

Did you know that there's another small country in Europe that packs a lot into a small area. Like Wales, the Basque Country is often forgotten by many. It too has mountains and seacoast; a history of heavy industry, fishing, and remote pastoralism. A Basque fishing port, Bermeo, is reminiscent of Y Bermo (Barmouth) in Wales.

There is a common history: Wales purchased iron ore for its industry from the Bilbao region. Welsh miners also fought alongside Basques in the Spanish Civil War. Basque children came as refugees to Gwent and Glamorgan in 1937.

Like Cardiff, the Basque cities have made a comeback in recent years. Bilbao has the new Guggenheim museum, among other architectural marvels.

The Basques, too, have struggled to preserve their ancient language and culture. Unlike Welsh, which is part of a language family (Celtic), Basque or Euskara is considered to be an isolate.

Almost a million people speak the Basques' ancient language, which is making a comeback in the schools, but still struggles for its place with Spanish or French. There is a vibrant culture, similar in scope to that of Wales. In both countries, music and poetry are key means of expression. From classical and jazz to folk and rock, the Basques too have an astonishing output.

Like Wales, the Basque Country endures... "aros mae".. despite everything arrayed against it.

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### **My Holiday Memory or I Left My Head in Euskal Herria (sung to the tune of I Lost My Heart in San Francisco).**

My family and I had been to Basque Land (Euskal Herria) on two previous visits in 2002 and 2005. We enjoyed ourselves immensely and had told our friends and family of the warm welcome, child-friendly feeling, great food, beautiful beaches, green mountains and warm dry weather.

The weather was pretty good so we went to a park for the children to play and so Nain, mum and dad could enjoy cafe con leche and Taid could enjoy izozki (ice cream). We were jet lagged so we decided to have a picnic in our room that night. Taid and Dad set out for our local store just as the heavens opened and a deluge worthy of Noah started.

As we ate our sandwiches I reassured my parents that it never rains two days in a row in Basque Land, tomorrow would come with clear and sunny skies.

We went down to breakfast the next morning to grey and rainy skies and the hotel staff were not at all optimistic about the weather. We tried the old town of Bilbao to do some shopping (for those of you who know June Edwards neither sleet nor rain nor world wars nor language barriers can get in the way of good shopping). It continued to rain and because of the siestas and different times of restaurant openings we had -- a picnic in our room again.

The next day we awoke to rain. Not just a fine mist that dampens things but a continued heavy downpour that seeped into shoes, drenched clothes and generally dampened spirits. We went to the Basque Ethnological and Historical Museum and spent as much time as possible inside as it was one of

the few inside and dry things going that would entertain a family of three generations. We were there so long we were in danger of becoming an exhibit.

The next day dawned cloudy but not pouring. We rented a van and went for a drive in the country. I had told my parents about a wonderful country inn we stayed at on our first visit with the best and cheapest food you could imagine. In my family there is an attitude when all else fails there is always food. So we set out full of anticipation and empty of stomach.

We arrived at the inn to discover they closed their kitchen two years previously. Oops. However all was not lost, there was a wonderful restaurant close by and they led us to it.

We sat down in a beautiful old farmhouse circa 1600 and waited breathlessly for our dinner. The Basques are quite like the Welsh in that there are very verbal. Before long we were friends with almost everyone in the restaurant. Sitting behind us was a group of four women who were very impressed with David's command of Basque -- at least that is what he told me. At the table beside us was a group of five couples. The men of the group were celebrating their 50th graduation anniversary from Yale Law School. We exchanged stories and finally our food came. Dad was disadvantaged in that he was sitting at the corner farthest away from the action and for all of you who know Tom Edwards, that wasn't going to last. One of the group of lawyers came over to talk to us and Dad introduced Mum as his first wife. The man smiled and said that he was celebrating his 7th wedding anniversary with his 2nd wife and that if he was still with his 1st wife he would be in jail for murder -- with the proviso that if the jury had met his 1st wife he would have been acquitted on compassionate grounds. Everybody laughed. Dad was not going to be outdone so he stood up quickly to respond with a better comeback only to smack his forehead into a 400-year old 2-foot solid oak beam.

The blood started to run, dad became very pale. The table behind us put ice from their wine bucket into a napkin. The staff ignored everything. And we all sat for a moment taking stock. The same man came back with his cell phone in one hand and his card in the other and said, "I can't help it, I'm a lawyer, if you have headaches in six months call me."

So other than the torrential rains, low-hung beams, and sandwiches in hotel rooms, I think my parents enjoyed their visit. Funny though, they haven't suggested going back!!!
