Neges y Gweinidog From the Dewi Sant Church Pulpit

I thought that I might use this occasion for me to introduce my faithful readers to the Right Rev. Gary Patterson, the United Church's 41st Moderator. He hails from Vancouver, B.C., where he served many pastorates, including First United in Vancouver's Downtown Eastside, at Ryerson United and, most recently, at St. Andrew's-Wesley in downtown Vancouver. He was elected during the General Council in August of last year and will hold office for three years. I knew him many years ago but, unfortunately have since lost touch with him.

On his website, Gary says that he "believes that The United Church of Canada must discover once again what 'being church' really means for us. What are the practices that sustain and shape our faith? How can 'church' model a different kind of community, so that people want to be a part of that? How do we share our faith with visitors, strangers, and the community? What is United Church evangelism?"

He continues, "If we aren't excited about our faith, then why would anyone want to 'come and see?' How do we speak to the spiritual hunger of a younger generation, people who are more interested in following Jesus than becoming church members? How do we reshape our 'outreach ministry' so that people will also say, 'See how much they love the world – I want to be part of that!'"

Good and vitally important questions, all, especially at Easter time when we celebrate the incredible, impossible mystery of the Resurrection which Christians since the beginning have claimed to be core, the foundation of our Faith.

In his Easter Message in the United Church Observer¹, the Moderator writes,

Easter stories surprise me. "Appearances," the Apostle Paul calls them. Fleeting, confusing, frightening – I sometimes wish for something more substantial and ongoing, as detailed perhaps, as the stories about Jesus' death. Now that was convincing! But resurrection? Well, often Jesus isn't even recognized: Mary mistakes him for the gardener; Cleopas and his friend, en route to Emmaus, spend an afternoon in Bible study with the risen Christ and have no idea with whom they are journeying; Jesus appears at dawn walking down the beach of the Sea of Galilee, and only after much squinting through the morning mist does one disciple finally cry out, "It is the Lord." Though even then, I hear a question mark at the end of that statement.

But perhaps this tells us something about how we ourselves might encounter the risen Christ this Easter: an elusive glimpse that cracks open our hearts, that requires openness and attentiveness, imagination and faith, and a willingness to discover Jesus in a garden or an upper room, on the shoreline or the road, at a table where bread is broken, or wherever we find ourselves in the day-to-day.

I like what Gary writes very much: the resurrection is an incomprehensible mystery we can never understand, that "requires openness and attentiveness, imagination and faith..."

At the same time, the mystery happens around us all the time: this morning, I saw two robins, even though as I write this it is beginning to snow again. The two birds are a sure sign of the spring

that is to come: the resurrection of the winter-dead earth. New life is just around the corner, we will smell it and taste it and revel in it.

Who says the resurrection is just a hoary myth? People can and do experience new life – after they have died to their old life. The people I have come to know through my son and his partner in Narcotics Anonymous, for example, are living testimony to new life and the power of new life.

I am grateful for Easter and the possibilities for new life Easter opens up for so many of us.

A blessed Easter to you all!

Umoja, The spirit of togetherness

As the daughter of a Welsh, Warrant Officer serving in the Royal Air Force, stationed in Colombo, Ceylon, where I was born, it is my privilege to write about the involvement of the Sri Lankan Army in the 2012 distribution for Sleeping Children Around the World [SCAW] in Sri Lanka.

Under the command of Colonel Jayasooriya and co-ordinated by Lt. Colonel Tennakoon and other senior officers, these soldiers have now turned from protecting the Sri Lankan people against terrorist attacks, into helping the country and the people heal and rebuild their lives. Communities have been shattered, lives lost, property destroyed, and Sri Lankans were fighting Sri Lankans.

How can we even begin to understand what these people have been going through?

But now, instead of only looking at the problems, how can we come up with opportunities for solutions? From Canada, what can we do to help? **SCAW** can help the children with donations of bedkits, which will help the whole family, and let the people know that they are not alone in their struggle. We care.

But we need help to do that. Gary will talk later about our Rotary partners who have co-ordinated the whole distribution, but the Army has had a major role in the physical aspect of this event, and they deserve our heartfelt thanks. With genuine military precision and attention to detail, their professionalism, efficiency, thoroughness and, most of all, their incredible kindness and gentleness with the children, has been inspiring.

They ensured the safety and security of every civilian involved: the Sri Lankans and our team, and indeed the bed kits themselves. They organized and transported the bedkits from Colombo to the north-eastern side of the island, manned the different stations of the distribution as you can see on the SCAW website if you view our Live Reports, at www.scaw.org, and were overwhelmingly helpful and patient with translations of our requests into Sinhalese and Tamil.

In "The Most Exotic Marigold Hotel" there is a quote, "Everything will be all right in the end. And if it is not all right, then it is not the end." So it was with us.

Traffic tie-ups in Toronto, illness of team members, photographer error, heat, fatigue -- all challenges that at some time were not "all right," but in the end 4,000 children have been given your generous gift of a bedkit to brighten their lives.

An African word I know is **umoja**, which means "the spirit of togetherness". This has been so evident in Sri Lanka. And so, not only to the Army, our Rotary Family from Colombo, the teachers, parents, my team mates, Brian, Emma, Gary, Heather and Joy, and our donors who have kept this spirit alive and well in Sri Lanka, I thank you from the bottom of my heart.

Red Dragon. The Welsh Dragon, or the **Draig Goch** as it is known in Welsh is the Welsh national flag. It shows a Red Dragon on a green and white background. Officially recognized as a national flag in 1959, however the Red Dragon had been associated with Wales for centuries and it is claimed to be the oldest national flag still in use today. The use of the Red Dragon however is no longer known, having been lost in the mists of time. The leek and the daffodil are also Welsh emblems and on St David's day, which is the 1st of March, you will often see the Welsh wearing them on their collar. **M**

"I was quite star struck," admitted head chorister Kathryn Page.

The 19-year-old student from nearby Solva later posted a photo on the social network Twitter that the award-winning actor and his wife were happy to pose for.

Deputy head chorister Abigail Ingram joined her in singing Somewhere Over the Rainbow and the Christmas carol Bethlehem Down.

"We were told that they had been married ten years and wanted to have a blessing. It was a small service, and Stella's niece was also there.

"It was quite a privilege, to be honest," said Ms Page, a student at Pembrokeshire College who plans to become an occupational therapist.

"When it was all over he came over to us and said to us both 'you have got wonderful voices'".

Port Talbot-born Sir Anthony, who will be 75 on New Year's Eve, lives in Los Angeles with his Colombian wife, but he is a frequent visitor to his homeland.

There is complimentary self parking at the hotel.

By the way, there are two Marriott hotels in Niagara Falls. Make sure you book into the **Marriott Gateway on the Falls.**

This year's guest choir is Côt Meibion Taf, a male voice choir from Cardiff. The tradition of Male Voice Choirs is alive and well in Wales, I'm delighted to report, and this relatively new choir is a wonderful example of what Wales has to offer. Maestro Robert Nicholls started the choir in 2004 and they have gone from strength to strength. This will be their first visit to Canada but they are very familiar with European countries. They are winners of the National Eisteddfod competitions and Rob, their conductor, is also a much sought after organist. He was one of the official Eisteddfod organists last August at the National Eisteddfod in the Vale of Glamorgan. Definitely not to be missed!

The Board is proud to announce that we offer two seminars this year. Mary Muckle of Ottawa will talk about the History of the Harp in Wales and entertain us with her playing. Dr John Ellis of Michigan University will talk about the Welsh novelist and patriot, Owen Rhoscomyl. He was quite a character and worked as a cowboy in North America and a mercenary in Patagonia, Cuba and S. Africa. Apparently he also worked as a spy for David Lloyd George during WW1.

It is with sadness that we learnt of the passing of Doreen Bray. Many of us in Dewi Sant Welsh United Church remember her well.


We send condolences to Doreen's family on behalf of our church community.
